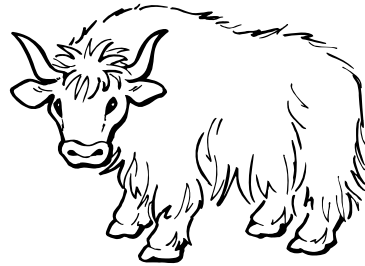

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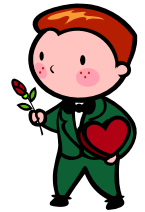

Dear Sad guy with Awesome Camera:

Well, it just so happens I recently took a film 205 class at the university of Yak, so this is right up my alley!

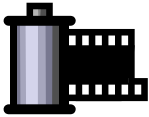
If the photos are too bright, it could be a problem in camera or developing. Try a ND (neutral density) filter on your camera, and always watch your in-camera light meter when adjusting your aperture and shutter speed...but beware of the shutter speed dropping below 1/30. as it may be prone to camera shake.

When developing, make sure to keep it in the developing fluid for the proper amount of time, and when making prints, keep prints in developer for a minute and a half. Then, have it in stop bath for 30 seconds, then in the photo fix for another minutes and a half. Be sure not to expose your photographic paper beforehand!

Hope this helps, and send me the pictures of Yaks that you will take on your next trip. It just might be a relative of mine!

### ***Katie Curtis answers "How has the United Church helped me with my transition to university?"***

As I moved away from home to attend University in Saskatoon, I wondered where I would go to church on Sundays. I have only been there once, because I have been returning home every weekend, but I feel secure in knowing that during the winter, when I am unable to return home, I will have a welcoming church to attend.

The second way the church has helped me with my transition, has been to offer youth orientated programs. With the stress and overwhelming feelings that come along with the first year of university, it has been great to have somewhere to go on Friday nights, and just hang out with my friends. During these times we sometimes talk about current issues, faith or just watch a movie. No matter what it is we do, I am always thankful to have a support group of friends within the United Church to talk with.

### ***YAYAC—National A Prairie Perspective***

This past weekend, Oct 19-21, 13 other youth from across Canada and I attended a meeting in Toronto. This meeting's purpose was to get some insight from Youth and Young adults on some new initiatives that have been put forward for planning. Out of the two proposals one was aimed more at youth and the other at Young adults. Youth Year of Service Program, the proposal aimed more at young adults, describes a program where 19 - 25 year olds would travel to a different province or conference and serve with a social justice partner of a local congregation/church for one year, the groups of people selected for the program would be 3-4 people and there would be 6 groups. The second proposal, Youth United for Peace, was more aimed at youth but also focused on young adults. This proposal described a trip for 30 youth and young adults who would travel and visit United Church Global partners to learn more about justice issues and be able to interpret them better. As a group however, we suggested that these proposals be tabled for the time being. Now I went through all this description for a reason, as we discussed these proposals a common theme emerged among our group. This theme was that while these proposals were very good proposals they weren't what was needed right at this time. As a group we felt that these proposals were one step ahead of where we should be. I and the group felt that the church should focus more strongly on attracting more youth to our church, not just those that don't attend church at all but those that come to church only on Easter or Christmas. The last item we dealt with was the Program called A Year of Sabbath; it's a program where 14 youth leaders through the church are taking a pledge of mutual support to engage in Sabbath practices for the length of a year. I was excited about this program (mainly because I'd heard about it over Facebook) because it represented an idea, mainly that spiritual meanings and practices are being lost in today's day and age. This thought has been circulating around in my head. It was this kind of deep thought and powerful discussion that dominated the meeting; frankly it blew us all away. This meeting was an amazing event and a chance to meet some old friends again. I enjoyed myself immensely and would go again in a heartbeat.

No matter where you live, or which United Church you attend, it is always pleasing to find a place to meet new people, and to experience the support of the community.

### CJ's Turn up the Awesome Chocolate Chip Cookies

Cream together  
1/2 cup margarine  
1/2 shortening

Add:  
1 cup white sugar  
1/2 brown sugar                      Mix well.

Add:  
2 eggs  
1 tsp vanilla                              Mix well

Add:  
2 cup flour  
1/2 sp salt  
1 tsp baking soda                      Mix well

Add:  
2 cup chocolate chips                      Mix.

Drop by spoonful onto an ungreased baking sheet (use an ice cream scoop for jumbo cookies). Bake at 350° for 8-10 minutes

(normal) or 12-14 minutes (jumbo). Cookies should be light to golden brown.

Makes 50 regular cookies or 12 jumbo
